Minutes of Regular Monthly Meeting

5-22-18 7:00 pm Field House

Roll Call/Call to Order:

The meeting was called to order at 7:05 pm and the Sunshine Law Statement was read.

Mike Ferrone, Kelly Kovacevic, Stacy Strum, Betsy Fila, Jim Buckley and Sandee Moroso-Fela in attendance. Dan Hartman joined us as a guest.

Minutes:

Stacy Strum motioned we approve the April 24th minutes and Kelly Kovacevic seconded. Minutes approved.

Guests/Public Input:

Dan Hartman, Chester Township resident, spoke about including Pickleball in our recreation plans. He proposed this idea to the Township too.

Pickleball is played on existing tennis courts or on a separate court. Dan will provide a proposal to the Commission for use of the courts on an "as needed" basis. Initially, the Commission would solicit interest in Pickleball through publicity and information on the websites. Depending on interest, instruction clinics would be then scheduled. We discussed the investment required, the necessary signage on the courts posting rules for usage of courts, and the gathering of feedback from Borough residents.

Discussion will continue and information on Pickleball is on file.

Correspondence/Applications:

Due to interest, the Extreme Volleyball Program requested adding 2 days to its use of the VB court. Now the clinics will be held M-Th 6:30-8:30 pm,

beginning June 4 - July 31. This was approved online. The group will pay \$100 for use of court for 2018 fall season.

Separately, Kelly Kovacevic recommended that the Commission review old guidelines and establish recommended fees to present to Council for use of park facilities that cover all uses equally to help in providing maintenance for the facilities.


- 1. Gazebo brick lining on walkway needs repair.

Why I play Pickleball

- PB has numerous health benefits.
- Unlike tennis, where 2 or 4 players usually compete in a single match, PB has a club-like atmosphere where groups of players socialize and compete in larger numbers.
- PB does not have a steep learning curve. If you've played any racquet or paddle sport, you
 can learn it in a day.
- · PB can be enjoyed by people of all ages.
 - Since PB attracts retired players, they will fill empty courts during week days.
- · PB scoring is more intuitive than tennis.
- PB courts are much smaller than tennis, so players don't chase balls as much.
- PB has is fun, and it has a strong social aspect to it.
- · PB can be very addictive.
- PB can be casual or competitive, whatever you like.
- PB is inexpensive to play.
- PB isn't about speed and power it's about strategy and placement so players of all
 ages and capabilities can play together.

Why Chester needs PB courts

- PB is the fastest growing sport in America.
- PB can be enjoyed by people of all ages.
 - Since PB attracts retired players, they will fill empty courts during week days.
- PB is a social sport, giving residents a new opportunity to make friends.
 - "Drop-in" format, where players stop by and join existing groups
- PB is a great couples and family sport.
- PB can be easily introduced into school physical education classes.
- · Free clinics and tournaments will increase popularity and use of park resources.
- Create a "Chester Pickleball Club" to promote the sport
 - Info on Township website, and/or create Facebook page
- For the township, the financial investment, though not negligible, is relatively small.
 - Re-stripe existing tennis courts, or
 - Build dedicated PB courts (4 can fit in a tennis court's footprint)
- PB can be year-round, using a school gymnasium during the winter months.

Pickleball Overview — Chester Township

Pickleball is often compared to tennis, badminton, ping pong and paddleball. It's played with a solid paddle and a whiffle ball. The sport has been around for decades, but has gained popularity in recent years. Courts are most common in warmer climates, where PB can be played year-round. It's also played at resorts and vacation communities, like the Jersey Shore.

Snowbirds and other travelers have brought PB back to their hometowns, and more courts are being built to keep up with the demand. The USA Pickleball Association (USAPA) estimates that in 2016, an average of 31 new courts were built every day.

There's no way to know how many PB courts are in nearby towns. Some local PB courts that I'm aware of include:

PB can be played as singles (2 people), but doubles is more common. PB clubs (formal or casual) often play at scheduled times, where members take turns playing and socializing. Some facilities offer lessons to promote the sport.





Existing tennis court with blue PB lines added:




Four PB courts can fit within the footprint of one tennis court:



PB fencing is lower than tennis, since a PB ball doesn't travel as far as a tennis ball.
